BRUCE TYRRELL'S VINTAGE REVIEW



I have great pleasure in announcing the release of our 2019 Private Bin whites.

This was probably the easiest vintage that I can remember, which means that nature did its job and the fruit ripened evenly by variety. We have now had three great years in a row, all with their own individual strengths. In 2017, the Chardonnays were the best; in 2018, it was the Shiraz; and in 2019, it is the Semillons. In some ways, the whites are quite like the 2013s - not too high in alcohol and with distinct vineyard characters, plenty of fruit and good, soft acid.

We had another dry winter and growing season, with just enough rain at the crucial times to get the fruit through. We were

able to alleviate some of the impact of the hot summer by getting our hands on almost enough grapevine sunscreen (kaolin clay, which is inert and has a neutral pH) and by allowing the western side of the vines to sprawl for better protection from the sun. As in 2018, there was no real rain during vintage, apart from thunderstorms on New Year's Eve and then on 11 January, but there was enough to get the fruit ripe. As in the past few years, the rain started three or four days after we finished picking.

We picked virtually all of the Chardonnay first and the resulting wines are all just 13% alcohol. Most of the picking days stopped at around 11am as it got too hot for the pickers and for the quality of the fruit. Despite these hot days, we had relatively cool nights, which let the vines recover and allowed us to start machine harvesting cool fruit at around 10pm to 12am. Once the Chardonnay was finished, we stopped for a few days, then stopped and started for another two or three days before going straight through and finishing all of the Semillon. The Vat 1 was the last white picked and for me, it was the best white fruit of the vintage, still with a lot of lime-green berries that had been shaded from the intense sunlight. The Semillons all have really distinctive vineyard characters and are true to their source. This year, we will be releasing the Pokolbin Hills Semillon young for the first time. This vineyard was first planted by Reg Drayton in 1970 and the fruit has always been made by us; we

now lease the vineyard from its current owners. The wine has some real strength on the palate - not unlike the structure of Vat 1 but with its own flavours and individual stamp of quality.

The HVD and Vat 47 Chardonnays are two quite different wines. The HVD, we believe, is the oldest producing Chardonnay vineyard in the world, which makes the wine extremely rare and collectable. It is a finer, more elegant style of Chardonnay, which I really enjoy. This year's Vat 47 is true to type, with great fruit and soft acid. The two Sacred Sites whites - HVD Chardonnay and Johnno's Semillon - both display the level of quality that underlines why we make them on their own.

There has been very little change in the prices of this year's wines, with Vat 47 and HVD Chardonnay going up \$2 per bottle and Johnno's Semillon up \$5 per bottle; the rest remain unchanged. We will also be releasing a Semillon tasting six pack

for \$200 and the white tasting dozen for \$429. For those who are a bit new to young Semillon, the six pack is a must have. We also have some large formats from 2019, with Vat 1 available in magnums, double magnums (three-litre bottles) and imperials (six-litre bottles) and HVD Semillon in magnums. For any of you with children or grandchildren born in 2019, this is a great year to put these large-format bottles away.

The brochure details all of our outside tastings and functions, and I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at these or, of course, here at the winery.

I cannot recommend these 2019 whites highly enough, especially the Semillons, but you should also consider getting some more 2018 reds, as they are really special.

It is with great pride that we present to you our Private Bin whites from the 2019 vintage, which turned out to be our third great vintage in a row. A continuation of the warm, dry conditions we've experienced over the past few years produced a smaller than average crop, but all of the fruit was of outstanding quality and so, too, are the resulting wines.

Bruce has already outlined the measures that we have undertaken in the vineyard to help combat the drought conditions and above-average temperatures; however, it is always amazing to witness how these wonderful old vineyards of ours handle any conditions that are thrown at them by Mother Nature. It was a vintage where we never seemed to be in any rush to pick, which meant that it was about as stress-free a vintage as we could ask for.

For some time, we have been discussing the use of a cool room to help us mitigate

the warmer conditions, the idea being to bring the temperature of our hand-picked fruit down significantly overnight. This year, we conducted a trial with a portion of our Vat 47 Chardonnay grapes and saw a very clear, positive result. The resulting wine was of a much higher quality than we were expecting and we will now look to expand on this in the future.

With no pressure in the vineyard, the winery team also had a vintage without too many bad hair days and as a result, I believe many of the wines we have produced are at the highest level. For me, Semillon is certainly the star this year and we have made some classic wines that are looking incredibly balanced already. They have terrific length and power while still being soft and flavoursome, reminding me of a mixture between 2004 and 2013.

The 2019 whites represent Andrew Spinaze's 30th vintage as our Chief



Winemaker, a remarkable achievement from a remarkable winemaker. I know that he rates these 2019s up there among his favourites during that time. In particular, he is very excited about the new-release Pokolbin Hills Semillon as it has always been one of his - and my - favourite Semillon blocks.

As mentioned previously, it is always a humbling experience for me as a fifthgeneration family member to work with the old vineyards here at Tyrrell's and help to be part of their history for this chapter in their lives. In particular, Johnno's Semillon and HVD Chardonnay, which come from two of the oldest white vineyards on the planet, are very important not just to Tyrrell's, but to the Australian wine industry as a whole. We see it as our duty to bottle the wines from these ancient vineyards on their own and to highlight their rarity and unique qualities.

Speaking of old vines, we recently received some outstanding reviews from James Suckling and Nick Stock as part of their Australian tastings. After making their way through more than 2,700 wines, they rated our 2018 Old Patch Shiraz their top wine, with a perfect 100 points. Our 4 Acres Shiraz and Johnno's Shiraz were also in their top ten wines of the year. With high scores for all of our 2018 Shiraz wines, it is great to receive this validation of what we believe is a great Shiraz vintage.

I hope you enjoy the 2019 white wines, which, for me, come from one of this decade's top white vintages, and I look forward to seeing you at our masterclass tastings around the country in September.

STORY OF OUR SINGLE VINEYARDS

Our Single Vineyards celebrate the best single blocks that produce wines of distinct character unique to that site and the Hunter. The redefinition of the vineyard source of our top wines has been the major change at Tyrrell's over the past 25 years.

For most of our history, Tyrrell's has produced its wines by blending wine from different vineyards. However, in 1983, HVD Semillon was created as our first formally recognised single-vineyard wine, although it would be another decade before we formalised our Single Vineyards.

Throughout the mid-1980s, we continued to investigate how the location and soil of each individual vineyard impart unique flavours to the wines they produce within the same varietal.

In 1992, Bruce Tyrrell struck a deal with the Stevens family, sealing it with a handshake. This key move once and for all opened our minds to the intrinsic quality and uniqueness of the great single vineyards of the Hunter Valley and beyond. Since then, we've set out to lease, purchase or enter into grape-buying arrangements with the very best vineyard sites in the Hunter Valley.

The wines are:

Stevens Semillon, HVD Semillon, Belford Semillon, Pokolbin Hills Semillon, Belford Chardonnay, Mother's Shiraz, Old Hut Shiraz, Stevens Shiraz, NVC Shiraz and Old Hillside Shiraz.





Stevens Semillon comes from Neil Stevens' Glen Oak vineyard on Marrowbone Road, our southern-most Semillon vineyard, which features a combination of light, sandy loams and darker, heavier transitional soils. The oldest plantings on this vineyard are from 1911.

As always, Stevens Semillon was one of the first Semillon blocks that we picked. This year, picking took place in the early hours of the morning on 26 and 27 January with a machine harvester. The grapes were then lightly pressed and the free-run juice was fermented at cool temperatures in stainless steel tanks. The wine stayed in these tanks until bottling in early July.

This year, Stevens shows a vibrant citrus lift with its typical mineral edge, similar to the 2018. The palate is tightly bound and has a racy citrus fruit profile that is tight, elegant and impeccably long, with a sherbet-like character.

The Single Vineyard HVD Semillon is only ever sourced from the 'Sign Post' block, which was planted in 1908. This vineyard is situated between two dry creek beds and features free-draining, sandy soils over coarse river sand.

The fruit was hand-picked on 2 and 4 February before being lightly pressed. The free-run juice was then fermented at cool temperatures in stainless steel tanks. The wine stayed in these tanks until bottling in early July.

The nose offers bright, lifted citrus characters. The palate is classic HVD, with fuller citrus flavours and a lovely soft, open texture with wonderful length and soft acidity. A benchmark HVD that is very similar to the classic 2004 vintage, which is still drinking remarkably well.

The Tyrrell family leases the Belford vineyard. It is our northern-most Semillon vineyard and was planted in 1933. Being the vineyard that is furthest away from the Brokenback range, it has the most broken-down soil, with a consistency similar to that of talcum powder.

The fruit was hand-picked on 31 January before being lightly pressed. The free-run juice was then fermented at cool temperatures in stainless steel tanks.

The wine stayed in these tanks until bottling in early July.

Compared to the vintage's other Semillons, the Belford shows a riper, richer nose. The palate is typical Belford - full and rich with a dense, robust quality.

The finish is balanced by a lovely soft acid profile.



The Pokolbin Hills vineyard was planted in 1970 and is located at the base of Pokolbin Mountain. Featuring ideal sandy loam soils, the vineyard is one of our top Semillon sites and is now being bottled as a stand-alone wine released with our Private Bin Semillons.

The fruit was hand-picked on 24 January before being lightly pressed. The free-run juice was then fermented at cool temperatures in stainless steel tanks. The wine stayed in these tanks until bottling in early July.

Pokolbin Hills is not unlike the Short Flat in that its wine always exhibits an extra dimension and depth of flavour not seen in many Semillons. It shows an intense citrus core and lovely texture through the mid-palate, with a brisk acidity that gives the wine great length and tension.

STORY OF OUR SACRED SITES


The Hunter Valley is home to some of the oldest vineyards in the world. Our Sacred Sites wines are made only from vines that are more than 100 years old and on their own roots. The origins of most of these vines lie in the Busby Collection - cuttings brought to Australia from Europe by James Busby and planted in the Hunter Valley in 1832.

These sacred sites are some of the most distinguished pockets of vineyard land in Australia, having survived the test of time and consistently making exceptional wines that have their own distinct character and unique qualities. In 2004, we decided to bottle these wines on their own and today they're among the rarest in the wine world, often available only on allocation.

The wines are:

Johnno's Semillon (planted 1908), HVD Chardonnay (1908), Johnno's Shiraz (1908), 8 Acres Shiraz (1892), 4 Acres Shiraz (1879) and Old Patch Shiraz (1867).





This wine comes from our Johnno's vineyard, which is situated just below the winery. Planted in 1908, it features sandy soils and is planted alongside Mary Anne's Creek, which runs all the way down to our iconic Short Flat vineyard.

This year, the fruit was hand-picked on 4 February before immediately being basket pressed. The juice was then cold settled for two days before being racked to another stainless steel tank to begin fermentation with a small amount of solids.


Made in a style reminiscent of the Hunter Semillons of yesteryear, the result is a more textured style of Semillon than we usually make. Pale in colour, it has a complex nose, with some citrus and a slight strawberry character that leads into an intense citrus core on the palate that is balanced by the wine's textural elements, followed by the soft acid line that gives it great length.

The 'Old Vines' Chardonnay block on HVD was planted in 1908 and is believed to be the oldest producing Chardonnay vineyard in the world.

The fruit was hand-picked on 19 January and then immediately basket pressed. The juice was then cold settled for two days before fermentation began in stainless steel tanks. The fermenting juice was then transferred to French oak barriques for eight months' maturation.

The wine is balanced between primary Chardonnay fruit flavours and secondary flavours derived from the minimal solids ferment and extended yeast lees contact, resulting in this wine's texture and mouthfeel.

STORY OF OUR WINEMAKER'S SELECTIONS

Murray Tyrrell created the Winemaker's Selection range in 1965, when, with the assistance of Len Evans, he set out to determine the best wines of each vintage. He named them after the cask in which they were matured; for instance, the first Chardonnay we made was fermented in cask number 47, so it became Vat 47 Hunter Chardonnay, or Pinot Chardonnay as it was then called. In those days, the fermentation and storage of both white and red wines took place in large old oak barrels. Over the years, the barrels have been updated, but the original numbers have endured.

In 1974, there was a consolidation of Vat numbers as we had up to six casks from

the same vineyard block that all tasted much the same. This consolidation reduced the selection to about 12 wines in total - a mixture of whites and reds.


The early 2000s saw a further consolidation with the inauguration of the Sacred Sites range and the expansion of our Single Vineyard program. Today, the Winemaker's Selections are estate-grown on the various blocks that form the wines that we believe best represent our land and preferred style.

These wines, along with those from the Sacred Sites and Single Vineyards, are only bottled in years when we believe that the quality is high enough to meet our standards.

The wines are:

Vat 1 Semillon, Vat 47 Chardonnay, Vat 63 Chardonnay Semillon, Vat 6 Pinot Noir, Vat 9 Shiraz and Vat 8 Shiraz Cabernet.





Vat 1 Semillon is only ever made from the best old blocks of Semillon. The centrepiece of this wine is always our Short Flat vineyard, where the oldest plantings date back to 1923. The soil profile in this dry-grown vineyard is unlike that of any of our other vineyards, which gives Vat 1 its amazing length and depth of fruit.

All of the fruit was hand-picked on 5 and 6 February in perfect condition before being lightly pressed. The free-run juice was then fermented at cool temperatures in stainless steel tanks. The wine stayed in these tanks until bottling in early July.


The nose shows a lifted floral character with a hint of citrus that is more intense than in recent years. The palate is grand cru-like in the sense that it has great depth and power yet maintains its elegance through the finish, with a softer acid profile giving the wine great balance. A classic Vat 1 with the exceptional length and balance only seen in great vintages.

Vat 63 Chardonnay Semillon is arguably the most unique wine Tyrrell's produce, made purely because the family and staff love the wine style so much. It is sourced entirely from the Pokolbin Hills vineyard, and is made up of 65% Chardonnay (planted in 1980) and 35% Semillon (planted in 1970).


Both of the varieties were vinified separately before being blended in June. The Chardonnay component spent its time in mostly older French oak barriques and the Semillon was made in a traditional unwooded style. The result is a wonderfully balanced white wine, showing rich Chardonnay fruit characters that are curbed by the elegance and length of the Semillon.

Vat 47 Chardonnay comes entirely from our Short Flat vineyard, where the original Chardonnay vines were planted by Murray Tyrrell in 1968. This year saw a return to picking later in January, with the majority of the Short Flat being picked on 29, 30 and 31 January - two weeks later than in 2018.

All of the fruit was hand-picked before immediately being basket pressed. The juice was then cold settled for two days before being racked to another stainless steel tank to begin fermentation. The fermenting juice was then transferred to French oak barriques to complete fermentation and maturation before bottling in October.

This year's Vat 47 treads the fine line between power and elegance. A complex nose shows white stone fruit with a hint of grapefruit and delicate flowers, and only a hint of high-quality French oak in the background. The palate is medium bodied and shows sweet Chardonnay fruit that is balanced by textural elements derived from the solids ferment and extended time on yeast lees.

The 2019 vintage of our Vat 1 Semillon is a landmark release as it is the 30th under the winemaking stewardship of our Chief Winemaker, Andrew Spinaze.

He first arrived at Tyrrell's as a young lad from Lismore in late 1979 to work a Hunter vintage before moving to Margaret River. He decided to come to the Hunter to see if everything he was told at Roseworthy College in South Australia about how hard it was to make wine in the Hunter was true or not. He spent the 1980 vintage spread between the Ashmans winery and the newly leased Glenbawn winery at Scone and the Bimbadgen winery, which we had leased for that vintage. Andrew returned to Lismore after vintage to make preparations to move to



Western Australia, but a telegram with a job offer from Bruce Tyrrell changed his mind. He accepted the offer of a full time job at Tyrrell's with the intention of staying for one, or maybe, two years (perhaps the west still lingers in his mind).

The winery was then under Murray Tyrrell's control and the day-to-day

management of John Cassegrain and then shortly after Mike


Andrew the position of Chief Winemaker with the understanding that wine would never be pushed up a grade above its quality only ever pushed down. In 2004 he was awarded Gourmet Traveller WINE Winemaker of the Year and Winestate *Magazine* Winemaker Of The Year. He was named Hunter Valley Winemaker of

> the Year in 2007. After these awards he became constantly in demand as a national wine show judge culminating in many panel chair positions and Chief Judge in Perth.

His time at Tyrrell's has been marked by a never ending quest to lift overall quality, and to never stop trying new things and testing old boundaries. The highlights of the 30 years are in the areas of development of Chardonnay and the development of his own oak in which to mature in. Semillon of course is the heart of Tyrrell's, and he has been an integral part in taking Semillon, and Vat 1 particularly, to its recognition as one of the great classic wines of the world. Everyone who has worked with him has come away a better winemaker with a broader knowledge, and the inspiration, to forever be improving.

Bruce Tyrrell says "Andrew is now considered part of the family, his 30 years as Chief Winemaker has flown by and perhaps in another 10 years we will be sitting on the front verandah with a flagon of sherry between us."

Vat 9 Shiraz is sourced from the oldest and best blocks on the Ashmans property, with the oldest vines dating back to 1892.

Gary Walsh, The Wine Front 96+ points: "Red and black fruits, sweet liquorice and milk chocolate on the sly, spice and plenty of perfume. Medium-bodied, fresh blackberry, lively, powerful, succulent and smooth, creaminess to the tannin, a chocolate and velour deluxe kind of feel, bright boysenberry acidity, and heaps of length. A very fine Vat 9. One for the ages."

The 8 Acres vineyard was planted in 1892 and sits just below the 4 Acres vineyard beside the driveway up to the winery.

Gary Walsh, The Wine Front 96+ points: "Juicy purple smelling wine, but also with ripe blue fruit, a slight earthiness, and a distinctly come-hither style - the 8 Acres is bringing sexy back. Supple, creamy flavour and ripe round tannin, a delicious perfume, and a smooth long finish, with just a hint of iodine. Will be a knock-out with careful cellaring."

2018 VAT 8 SHIRAZ CABERNET \$50

The Vat 8 Shiraz Cabernet is sourced from Shiraz grown on the Ashmans property and Cabernet Sauvignon grown on Pokolbin Hills Estate. 90% Shiraz, 10% Cabernet Sauvignon.

James Suckling 95 points: "There's a subtle blend into more purple fruit on the nose here with a gentle, leafy edge, across red cherries, plums and fresh oak. The palate has such tautness and firm, dense yet fine tannin - barriques used here - with some very attractive red plums and mulberries and toasty young wood to close."

2018 OLD HILLSIDE SHIRAZ \$45

Cellaring: 10+ years

Formerly known as Stevens Shiraz, the Old Hillside Shiraz comes from the younger vines on the vineyard, which have an average age of 50 years.

James Suckling 97 points: "Wow. This shows amazing aromas of cherries and berries with wet earth, hot stone and violets. Full body. Very dense and layered with hints of cream and floral undertones. The round and creamy tannins are so beautiful now. Intense centre palate here. Hard not to drink now but will improve with time."

2018 STEVENS SHIRAZ

A new wine to our Single Vineyard range, Stevens Shiraz is now sourced from the Stevens-family-owned Glen Oak vineyard. Glen Oak is located on Marrowbone Road and is also the source vineyard for Stevens Semillon.

James Suckling 93 points: "A very pure and pristine red-plum, cherry and cassis nose with a super fine, elegant and fresh feel on the palate. Superb depth and drive. Astonishing value."

This block was planted in 2010 with cuttings from 4 Acres, Johnno's and Old Patch, ensuring that our best Shiraz clones are preserved.

Gary Walsh, The Wine Front 94 points: "Sweet Hunter earth, perfume, boysenberry, cherry, bit of cracked pepper, mint. Medium-bodied, purple

fruit, forest berries, creamy mid-palate and tannin, mouth-perfume, clean minerally acid, very good length. A lush feel, and exceptionally high drinking appeal. Tempted to rate it a little higher."

Cellaring: 10+ years

The Old Hut vineyard is situated right next to 4 Acres. It was planted in 2003 with cuttings from the 4 Acres vines and features the same ideal soils.

"Hard not to drink now but will improve with time."

James Suckling 94 points: "Extremely aromatic with flowers and crushed strawberries and hints of hot stones

and violets. Some lemon rind as well. Medium-to full-bodied and very focused with extra-fine tannins and a flavourful finish. Extremely energetic. Extremely fine-grained."







